


VOCABULARY EXTENSION

The Robin Hood Robber

If you report the crime, the money will be taken away from the orphanage and given back to the bank.

What should you do?

The Runaway Trolley

A runaway trolley is heading down the tracks toward five workmen who will be killed if the trolley proceeds on its present course. You are on a footbridge over the tracks, in between the approaching trolley and the five workmen. Next to you, there is a stranger who happens to be very large. If you do nothing the trolley will proceed, causing the deaths of the five workmen. The only way to save the lives of these workmen is to push this stranger off the bridge and onto the tracks below, where his large body will stop the trolley, causing his death.

Would you push the stranger onto the tracks in order to save the five workmen?
